From the Rector's desk: As I write a reflection for this bulletin we are coming upon the first Sunday of Advent, a time when we are ever conscious of the closeness of the Christmas season. Ordinarily there would be an immense anticipation of these weeks of Advent, the excitement of Christmas would be in the air, and we would be in the festive celebratory mood, parties would be planned, families would have plans made to travel from abroad, and our lives overflowing with joy. However, at this point it looks like Advent and Christmas will not be the same this year as in previous ones. When we entered this Pandemic back in March we were in the midst of the Lenten season, thus Easter celebrations and worship services were cancelled. Subsequently we adjusted to the reality that the Pandemic was going to be a part of our lives for awhile, but had a large degree of optimism that we could look forward to a real celebration of Christmas with our families. Perhaps we underestimated the danger and stubbornness of the Corona Virus, or the discipline of the population to stick to the plan, obey and be governed by our political and medical experts. Whatever our expectations were, it looks like even the Christmas season will be severely impacted by Covid-19, as alarming numbers of new infections are seen right across Canada and beyond. We are, at this point, still doing well in our own province but even our numbers are starting to concern us again. So we don't know what restrictions will be in place to guide us safely during this Advent and Christmas season, but we do know that Advent and Christmas will still occur as it does each year, the only thing that might change is our ability to celebrate in all the traditional ways. The four themes of Advent, which we celebrate each of the four Sundays, is Hope, Peace, Joy and Love, the core meaning of those are felt and expressed in our hearts and lives. Even in the midst of this worrisome Pandemic we must still find ways to experience each one of these themes in our daily living. We will get through this Pandemic, already there are good signs of progress in the search for effective vaccines, which we pray will be made available to the population by early 2021. So, we know Advent is here (as of Nov. 29th), we know the very first theme will be Hope. let's take it one week at a time and really focus our attention on each theme as they

God willing, here at St. Philip's we will celebrate each of the four Sundays of Advent in community worship, preparing ourselves for the glorious celebration of Christmas. Christmas Eve celebrations will look a little different this year as well as we gather for worship. In the essence of care and safety for everyone our Sunday School did not resume during the pandemic, therefore. the children will not be featuring their traditional Christmas program at 4:00 pm. However, it is our intent to hold our regular Christmas Eve services at 4:00 pm. 7:00 pm and if necessary 11:00 pm. It will be necessary for anyone planning to attend to call and register ahead of time, as our maximum numbers right now are capped at 100 people. Traditionally the church would be filled at 4:00 pm, but we will not be able to do that this year. Call and register and if the numbers are at a maximum you can be registered for the next service. We hope by making provision for three services we will accommodate everyone that desires to attend a Christmas Eve service. As we approach this most holy and festive season don't allow Covid-19 to steal from you the joy of the Saviour's birth, and the peace and light that he brought into our world. Make a determination that you are really going to use each of these four weeks of Advent to prepare for the celebration of Christmas, and that we can still celebrate the Lord's birth even without many of the traditions of the past. We will get back to that God willing for Christmas 2021, but this year let's do what we can to make sure we still hold true to the humble birth of our Saviour in a stable in Bethlehem over 2000 years ago.

Baptisms and weddings are still being done inside the church building. For now, baptisms are still taking place outside the normal worship times. We must still adhere to the maximum number of 100 persons and sanitizing the building after each use. If you need to book a baptism or wedding please call Rev. Randy. We can do these as long as we abide by the government and health regulations around Covid-19. If you have a child to be baptized please call Rev. Randy to set up a time.

We are still checking out the possibility of an FM frequency at St. Philip's. Thanks to Vestry member Tom Tulk we know that such a system will cost approximately \$2500. Vestry must now decide if this cost is affordable in these difficult times of Covid-19 when parish income is dramatically down. If it is something anyone would like to donate in memory of loved ones please speak to Rev. Randy. The system would allow for outdoor services being broadcast via your car radio instead of having to lower your windows, especially on a cold wet day. It would also be good for the cemetery services for those who have mobility issues. The system is usable within a 500 feet radius.

The 8:30 am worship services have now resumed. Anyone attending the service will have to register the same as for the 10:30 am service, and adhere to the diocesan and medical officer's restrictions.

We have two more Sundays to return the forms for the annual tree lighting ceremony. All forms and donations must be returned by Sunday, December 13th, so as to prepare the names for the lighting of the tree on Tuesday, December 15th.

Thank you to all who supported the ACM Salmon Dinner on Saturday, November 21st. Nearly 100 takeout dinners was sold, and a profit of over \$1200 was realized after expenses. Thank you to those who purchased the dinners, gave donations or helped in the process of cooking and serving them.

Christmas Food Hampers will be made available to people in the community should there be a need. Many people struggle to provide enough food for their families all the time, and at Christmas they often struggle even harder to make it a joyful occasion for their children. If you know of anyone that might be struggling this year at Christmastime and could use a little help, please let Rev. Randy know. Most of us are
