A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH.

From the Rector's desk: Sunday coming (May 31st) is an extremely important day in the life of the Church, for it is *The Day of Pentecost*. It is now 50 days since Easter Sunday, and, ordinarily I would say it is 50 days following the great celebration of Easter, however, because of Covid-19 there was not a church celebration this year. In Jesus' post-resurrection appearances to his disciples and other followers, he promises them an Advocate or a Comforter to guide them. We must remember that after Jesus' death his followers, and, especially his disciples, were a very dejected and deflated group of people. When Jesus was with them everything was fine, they had their leader, and they were emboldened to go out into the world (their known geographic world) and proclaim the Messiah. When Jesus is nailed to the cross and buried they suddenly lose courage and hope. They begin to question everything the Master had told them and taught them, they became almost like sheep without a shepherd. On the third day Jesus rises from the grave and he spends some time appearing to his disciples to once again give them reassurance that he is alive, and, to build up their courage and hope once more so that they could rise to the task of preaching the gospel and establishing the Church. In this once merry band of followers Jesus needs to infuse them with a new zest and energy that would propel them into action. Jesus knew that following his ascension back to God the Father, he would need to send the Holy Spirit upon his disciples and followers. So, before he returns to God he says to them – "*I will not leave you comfortless, I will send you the Comforter (Holy Spirit) to teach you all things and to bring to remembrance all things*". Then comes the day of Pentecost, when the disciples are all together in one place and the Holy Spirit descends upon them, they are speaking in tongues, and they are so happy and excited that some people think they are drunk on alcohol, Peter has to explain to others that this is God's Holy Spirit, the fulfillment of the prophecy of Joel in the Old Testament, that God would pour the Holy Spirit on the people. This is the long awaited catalyst to move out and change the world. We often refer to Pentecost Sunday as the birthday of the Church, for it is from that day on that the Church really begins to take form and come into being. If we were meeting today inside the church building we would have a birthday cake and some

balloons to celebrate the birthday of the Christian Church. In some ways, in these current days of Pandemic, we too can somewhat identify with the plight of the early disciples, we have been outside of our church buildings for 11 Sundays, finding alternate ways of worshipping. When we share in parking lot worship, as we have been doing for the past 6 Sundays, the one thing most everyone says is – "*it's so good to gather together on Sunday morning, even if we can't sit in the church together*". We all look forward to the time when we can once again sit in the church pews and stand and sing the hymns together and come forward to the altar rail to receive the Eucharist. We will get to that point, but, for now we still need to be creative and find ways to keep spiritually fed in this desert time we are in. One of the important things we bear in mind is that we are a church family, we have been baptized into the family of God, and, together we have been emblazoned with the seal of Christ on our foreheads, the sign of the cross. Being part of a family is a very strong connection, for example, look at our own family units, there is a bond that draws us together that is never broken. As parents, children, brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles and cousins, there is a bond or family tie that keeps us together even when we are separated and living on the other side of the world. This bond of love is the cement that keeps us together. So too is the bond of love (in Christ) that makes us part of his family. The cement that keeps us together in that family is the same baptism we share in common. Baptism makes us one with Christ, and heirs with God. So, we will not be dejected and defeated, we will not lose hope and despair, because we support one another in prayer and fellowship. As the Holy Spirit was sent upon Jesus' followers on that first Pentecost Sunday, so too, that same Spirit is with us, and we are assured that God is not absent from us. We have the assurance that God will never leave nor forsake us, but will abide with us in every situation of life – including this Pandemic. So, this Pentecost Sunday, celebrate that Holy Spirit, and, if you are able join us at St. Philip's parking lot at 10:30 am you are welcome to help us celebrate the Church's birthday. (we adhere to the principle of physical distancing so please remain in your vehicles at all times). Remember, God loves you, you are in good hands, and God is able to meet every need we have. Don't lose hope, keep the faith for this is still God's world, God is still in Heaven, and we are blessed.

Though it is at St. Lawrence's church it is a community venture supported by other churches and community organizations including our own parish of St. Philip.

From our Primate: Dear friends in Christ: Recently we have heard news that the Corona virus has now spread into Canada. Many of us remember the SARS crisis and the precautions that were needed when it came close to our communities. First, our prayers are extended to those who are ill with this virus and those who are caring for them. So far there has been no call from public health officials for additional measures in public activities. This naturally impacts our parish finances for the year which is always concerning to Vestry. We ask our parishioners that have been unable to make their offerings to please consider helping us make up the difference throughout the year.

Please try to be regular in your weekly offering to the parish. As we now enter into the months of Summer, many people will be enjoying the nice weather (we hope) and travelling around more, or spending more time at the cottage, etc. If you are able to get your envelope offering to the parish that will be a tremendous help to us to keep up with our monthly bills. You can mail them to the parish, drop them off to the office during the week, or you can use our E-transfer (this is new for us). Thank you for your faithful support to St. Philip's parish even through this time of Pandemic.

During this time with our church building closed down a few people are opting to sign up for E-Giving. The form for this is available on the church website with all the relevant information. Rev. Randy will be at the church every Sunday morning during close-down for anyone that would like to come by the church to drop off their weekly offering. The time for this will be between 10:00 am – 12:00 noon. Of course you can drop by anytime during the week as well when the office is open, or, you can mail it to the church. It is so important for us to keep up with our regular offerings to the church during this time so that we can keep all the church bills paid.

In this case of a global Pandemic, and, as we see the situation in our own nation, province and communities presently, the whole Church of every single denomination and faith are in exactly the same position. We pray that as we come through this desert time the church will find that it has been strengthened and given a clear vision of ministry. We pray that there will be a resurgence of living faith and that the church will be bold in leading it.

Please keep our building secure. We have had no major security issues, but from time-to-time it is good for us to remind everyone entrusted with a key to the building that it is the responsibility of that person to safe guard the key, and to ensure the key is never given to any unauthorized person. Please ensure that all lights are turned out, the door securely closed and locked. If a person receives a key for a specific duty and that person is no longer in that role the key must be returned so it can be given to the new person in that role.

Remember (when things get back to normal) that the first Sunday of each month there will be coffee/tea, juice and other refreshments served prior to the 10:30 am worship service.
