#### From the Rector's desk:

As I write this brief reflection we find ourselves halfway through the season of Advent. We have already focused on the themes of *Hope* and *Peace*, and this Sunday coming (Dec. 13th), we will be lighting the third candle on our Advent wreath, the pink candle of Joy. Then, on the fourth and final Sunday of Advent we will light the candle of Love. The fifth candle, the Christ Candle we will light on Christmas Eve to signal the birth of our Saviour. Have you ever thought about the nature of the Advent Wreath, why we have the themes of hope, peace, joy and love in a circular wreath with the Christ Candle burning brightly in the centre? One can search Google these days and find information on just about any conceivable concept or idea, but have you thought about what the Advent Wreath means to you in a personal way? As we begin Advent each year we do so with a goal in mind, and, for most of us I believe that goal is to focus in on each of the themes week by week, so that when Christmas Day arrives we feel we have had a spiritual journey. As we zero in on these themes during the four weeks of Advent we also realize that Hope. Peace, Joy and Love are among the defining characteristics of our daily Christian living all year long. They are the ideals we regularly pray for in our world, because they are what Christ came into the world to instill in each of us. The world Jesus was born into was one devoid of these four ideals, one where the darkness of sin had diminished the light of God. It was a world where those still in relationship with God desired that light to shine brightly again. We catch many glimpses of this from the writings of the Old Testament prophets, especially from those of Isaiah. We are especially familiar with the prophecy of Isaiah during Advent and Christmas, because he is one bright light in the darkness of the world, as he proclaims the coming of Christ about 740 years before Christ is born. Isaiah 7:14 says "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, the young woman shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel". These Old Testament Messianic prophecies kept hope alive for a long time before they were fulfilled in the birth of Jesus.

patience, as well as much hope, peace, joy and love as the guiding principles of our waiting time. The Advent wreath is round, it neither has a beginning nor an end, and neither does the symbolism of each candle. Hope, Peace, Joy and Love ought to permeate the DNA of every Christian. You remember the old chorus we sometimes sing - and they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love, yes they'll know we are Christians by our love. We could easily sing it using the other Advent ideals of Hope, Peace and Joy as well. As we follow Christ in the modern age we can find stark similarities to our own time and that of Isaiah nearly 2800 years earlier, where many people had fallen away from following and serving God opting instead for a "Me Only" way of life. When we forget God, the creator and sustainer of our lives, and decide to make our own way in the world, our world becomes darker and more dangerous. That was the experience of the prophets, people were no longer listening or heeding God's commandments; however, they never gave up believing that God was still present in their lives and in the life of the world. Those prophecies were fulfilled by the birth of Jesus, and more than 2000 years later that light still shines in our world. That's why the Christ Candle stands majestically in the centre of our Advent wreath, symbolizing Christ as the very centre of our lives. Of course there are things that happen in our world that threatens to extinguish that candle, and sometimes that flame almost seems to smolder, and darkness seems close, but it never has gone out because no matter what we choose to live with Hope, Peace, Joy and Love with Jesus at the centre of our lives. As you continue to focus on these weeks of Advent leading up to the celebration of Christmas day, think about these ideals and how you will use them daily to be the guiding lights of your journey with Christ. We all have the power to bring light to our world in how we choose to live our lives. We also have the power to make our world a little darker with a little less hope, peace, joy and love. When we all decide to be agents of light, beacons of hope, we make Advent and Christmas an even more

Sunday, December 13<sup>th</sup> our Advent theme is "JOY". "Rejoice: the Lord is nigh." As Christmas draws near, the Church emphasizes the joy which should be in our hearts over all that the birth of our Savior means for us. The great joy of Christians is to see the day drawing nigh when the Lord will come again in His glory to lead them into His kingdom. The oft-repeated Veni ("Come") of Advent is an echo not only of the prophets but also of the conclusion of the Apocalypse of St. John: "Come, Lord Jesus," the last words of the New Testament. Today is known as Gaudete Sunday. The term Gaudete refers to the first word of the Entrance Antiphon, "Rejoice". A rose candle is used on the Advent wreath to emphasize our joy that Christmas is near.

The consecration of our Bishop – Elect, Archdeacon Samuel Rose, will be held at our diocesan cathedral on Tuesday, December 15<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. This event is by invitation only because of the Covid-19 restrictions. Please keep Archdeacon Sam and his family in your prayers as he prepares to lead our diocese forward.

The Consecration of our new bishop will be live-streamed. It is our plan to <u>live-stream it to our screens here at St. Philip's church this coming Tuesday evening, Dec. 15, at 7:00 pm.</u>

At the moment our maximum numbers are still set at 100 people at a time. Of course we are still in the grip of the pandemic and things can change quickly, but if all is as it is now we will have three time slots to choose from on Christmas Eve.

December 20<sup>th</sup> is the last Sunday of Advent and our theme is that of "Love". The fourth candle is lit on this day along with the first three. It is the Angel's candle, reminding of the heavenly hosts that proclaimed Christ's arrival with "Behold, I bring unto you good tiding of great joy!" God's love for us is why we have the Incarnation, God coming to us in human form to show us the way into the Kingdom. Love is the very essence of all our relationships with each other and with God. The greatest example we have of unconditional love is that shown by Jesus by his life, ministry, death and resurrection.

So, as we prepare our hearts and lives for the celebration of the birth of our Saviour, use the four weeks of advent to help us get ready for the greatest event in human history — the birth of our Lord, bringing light and hope to a dark world.
