From the Rector's desk:

In the gospel reading today there are a multitude of themes that can be drawn upon for in-depth theological reflection, such as good and evil, division and unity, faith or lack of, forgiveness of sins, the family of God, to name a few. In the present age, the lines of distinction and clarity often become blurry and confusing, and we are not sure of what is acceptable to God, or what God truly desires of us. In the Anglican way we have always used the tripod of *Scripture, Reason* and *Tradition* to govern our relationship and understanding of who God is, how God interacts with us, and how we discern the will of God in our lives. As I referenced in my reflection last week, faith is ever so fluid, because we believe in and serve a living God. God is present to us in every generation, we have the word of God, written and passed on to us, that describes how God was working in the lives of people in those generations, but for more than two thousand years, God has been very much at work as well. St. John 20 says that *many other things were done and said by Jesus that are not written in this book...* When the book of Revelation was written, and, included as the last book of the bible, it was

not God's final word, for God has been talking to us ever since. When Jesus' last recorded miracle was written in St. John 21, the story of the second miraculous catch of fish on the Sea of Tiberias, it was not his last miracle, for we believe there has been millions of miracles since then, and we still live in the age of miracles. When a small child survives for days, and, is plucked alive and unharmed from the rubble of an earthquake, that is a miracle; when medical knowledge says nothing else can be done for the patient, but he/she against all odds and logic makes a full recovery, that is a miracle. God is not limited to any particular age or generation, so we must always be working on our faith, trying to find time and space to speak to, and hear the voice of God in this ever busy, and, often times crazy world. Sometimes it might seem that God is removed from the world, nowhere to be found, and doesn't care for us, but we must be assured that is never the case. Jesus said, *Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age* (Mt. 28:20) We have to use what is available to us to strengthen our faith and relationship with God, the recorded scriptures (which have to be studied intensely sometimes to truly capture what God is saying), the sacraments (especially Baptism and Eucharist) that truly provides opportunity to experience the living Christ in our lives, the Church, and our brothers and sisters in Christ. In the gospel reading Jesus says *whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister*. The challenges
