A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH.

From the Rector's desk: In an age where many people claim to be able to commune with God in nature, in their workplace, at their cabin, or wherever they find themselves on a Sunday morning, and say they don't need to attend church to be close to God, today's Gospel reading finds Jesus in the Synagogue on the Sabbath, *as was his custom*. I think it's very important that we be in communion with God wherever we are on any day of the week, but we cannot forget the vital importance of coming together as the community of faithful to support, encourage and strengthen one another in the Christian journey. Jesus encouraged prayer and worship daily, and, in all places and circumstances, both on a personal level and a communal level. He recognized the importance of coming together in numbers, that's why he chose 12 disciples and not only one, that's why he gathered people together in large numbers to teach and to preach regularly, and, that's why his custom was to be in the Synagogue on the Sabbath. There is great blessing for all of us when we meet together on a Sunday morning, and, join our voices in prayer, worship and praise, and, we find something there spiritually satisfying that we cannot find alone. God uses us to be a blessing to one another, and to be blessed together in a powerful way. Human beings were not created to exist alone, but to be part of a bigger community. There are all kinds of ways that we live in community, it may be part of a larger family of parents, siblings,

grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins; it may be getting involved in the geographic community in which we live, it may be a network of workers, whatever it might be we find fulfillment from it. The same is true of our church family; it is not by accident that we make up the parish family of St. Philip's, God calls us together in this place to be one in fellowship and worship. Whenever we make a decision to remove ourselves from public worship, and, to separate ourselves from the rest of the community, we do a great disservice to ourselves, others that make up the worshipping community, and yes, even God, for God has created us to be in fellowship and community. Let us use Jesus' example in the gospel reading today as our invitation to regular public worship. Just imagine the blessings that flowed in the Synagogue that day Jesus was there, as he read from the prophet Isaiah, and went on to talk about ministering to the poor, restoring sight to the blind, freeing those in captivity and those oppressed. They were, whether or not they knew it, on holy ground that day. Of course Jesus went on to preach in the streets, in the valleys, on the hills, on the seashores, from a boat and wherever else he happened to be. But there was something special and sacred to Jesus to be found in the Synagogue as well. I think we capture the essence of that sacredness on a Sunday morning that is more powerful than anywhere else perhaps. It happens when we meet together as the community of faith. *(Rev. Randy)*

A reminder to those who find themselves as patients in our local hospitals, that hospital chaplains are available for pastoral care. As we know, hospitals are very diligent in protecting the privacy of all patients, so it may be that your name will not be on the visitation list unless you specifically ask for it to be there. When you are admitted please be very clear that you want the Anglican chaplain to visit you if that is your wish.

Planned Giving is an important teaching of the church. Our diocese has a Planned Giving consultant that would love to speak to anyone that has an interest in learning more about how this works, especially the importance of having up-to-date wills, that state explicitly what a person's last wishes are for his/her estate. You can visit the diocesan website also to get more information, and, we do have brochures on the table in the foyer. Here is some of the information you will see on the website: *Remember that when you leave this earth, you can take with you nothing that you have received – only what you have given: a full heart enriched by honest service, love, sacrifice and courage. As we begin another year, your rector and vestry are hoping that we will have ended 2018 financially on track as a parish. As we try to adhere to the diocesan expectation of parishes to be more ministry and mission minded going forward, we will need to put a special emphasis on envelope givings and less on fundraising. A financially healthy parish is one that meets at least 80 – 90 percent of its annual budget by free-will givings in the offering plate. Many of the folks that do fundraising in parishes are the ones that are getting older and just don't have the energy to keep up with it. We would like to arrive at a time and place where fundraising activities will be used for outreach ministry more than meeting parish budgets out of necessity.

When do I stand, sit or kneel? Our goal is worship and not conformity, so, whatever you choose to do is right for you.

Rev Randy is now receiving names for 2019 Confirmation. Bishop Peddle will be visiting our parish for Confirmation on December 1st, 2019 at the 10:30 am worship service. Once the registration process is complete the classes will begin in March. The person to be confirmed must be at least 11 years of age on or before the date of Confirmation. All those to be Confirmed should be registered no later than February 28th.

New Vestry members will be needed at the annual meeting in February. Membership on the Vestry is open to anyone in the congregation with an interest in serving. Vestry meets once per month, on the second Tuesday, to deal with the business of operating our parish, and to plan and carry out many things. Please prayerfully consider giving of your time for this very important decision-making group.

Anyone wanting to sign up for Electronic Givings there are forms available from the parish office. This takes the place of the regular offering envelopes on Sunday morning and ensures that even if you are away or can't make it on a particular Sunday the parish still receives your regular offering. This helps the parish to keep up with its financial obligations.

Please keep our building secure. We have had no major security issues, but from time-to-time it is good for us to remind everyone entrusted with a key to the building that it is the responsibility of that person to safe guard the key, and to ensure the key is never given to any unauthorized person. Please ensure that when you use the key to access the building it is your duty to ensure that all lights are turned out, and, the door securely closed and locked. If a person receives a key for a specific duty and that person is no longer in that role the key must be returned so it can be given to the new person in that role.

2018 Contribution Receipts are now available on the table in the foyer. These are the ones that you will need for income tax purposes.
