From the Rector's desk:

I take the opportunity today to wish all the dads of our parish, and those visiting with us, a very Happy Father's Day! Yet another opportunity to celebrate the family, so, may this day be a blessing for all families. Like every other special occasion, Father's Day too can be overly commercialized, but somewhere in the midst of that be sure to spend that quality time with family. The most familiar story of how Father's Day originated is as follows: The first father's day was celebrated in Washington State on June 19th, 1910. A lady named Sonora Smart – Dodd came up with the idea of honoring and celebrating her father while listening to a Mother's Day sermon at church in 1909. Her dad, William Smart, was a veteran of the American Civil War, but was left a widower when his wife died while giving birth to their 6th child. He went on to raise the children by himself on their small Washington farm. To show her appreciation for all the love and hard work he gave them, Sonora thought there should be a special day to honor him, and all other dads in that situation. At first she thought June 5th, the anniversary of her dad's death, would be a good time to celebrate Father's Day, but, for

logistic reasons, it had to be put off to the third Sunday of June. It started off slow at first, but, in 1924 President Coolidge recommended that Father's Day become a national holiday. No official action was taken. In 1966 Lyndon B. Johnson, by executive order, designated the 3rd Sunday in June as the official day to celebrate Father's Day. However, it wasn't until 1972, that Father's Day was officially recognized as a national holiday. Other countries, like Canada, also picked up on the idea of Father's Day. Today, we celebrate all our Fathers, those living and those who have passed on to eternal rest, thanking God for them, and their love which shaped, and, is shaping our lives today. Happy Father's Day, may you be blessed today with the love of family and the love of God, the Father of us all!

There I stood beside the mailbox With a face so very red Instead of mailing you my letter I opened it instead!




