Launching out into the Deep.... Into New Spiritual Depths



From the Rector's Desk

This is my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.

It is a good and commendable thing for us to begin with some preparation for Lent since this is the last Sunday in Epiphany and next Sunday we are in the **Season of Lent.**

In this Liturgical Year we are in Cycle B with regards to the readings appointed for Sunday worship. The Gospel lesson for Lent 1 this year is Mark 1: 9-15. It is Mark's account of Jesus' **baptism,** his **temptation,** and the beginning of Jesus' **ministry** in Galilee. Mark does not tell us what the temptations were, as does Matthew and Luke, but it is clear Mark links the above three things together right at the beginning of his Gospel. We need to reflect on this.

It seems like a good idea <u>as we make preparation for</u>
<u>Lent</u> to take a fresh look at our Lord's baptism; especially at the
words that the voice from heaven spoke at the Lord's baptism; to
see what these words indicate or what they reveal concerning our
Lord's identity and His ministry as we begin our Lenten journey
with our Lord to Jerusalem and Good Friday. For this exercise, I
will quote extensively from a book written by William Barclay
entitled "The Mind of Jesus." (Note: Barclay mentions the name,
Justyn Martyr. Justin was one of the early church fathers and
teacher of the church, martyr at Rome around 167. The church
holds his memorial on June 1st. Barclay also mentions the Gospel
according to the Hebrews. This writing is not within the Canon of
Holy Scripture.)

"The voice which came to Jesus said: 'Thou art my beloved Son; with thee I am well pleased.' That saying is composed of two sayings from the Old Testament. 'Thou art my beloved Son' is a quotation from Psalm 2:7. Psalm 2 is a description of a testing time in the life of the king of the holy nation. The heathen rage and rebel; but the king can have perfect confidence, because God has taken him as His son, and His cause is safe in the hands and in the power and in the promise of God. Not only will His own realm be safe and His own throne be secure and His immediate enemies conquered and subdued; the day will come when God will extend His kingdom to the ends of the earth. No doubt when the psalm was first composed and sung it was meant for a definite situation in history when the throne of Israel was in peril; but as the days went on, that psalm came to be regarded as a messianic psalm

and as a prophecy and foretelling of the triumph of the Messiah, the anointed King of God. So., then, when Jesus heard this voice, He knew Himself to be the Messiah, the King sent by God to be the Lord of men and the ruler of the earth. Here is the forecast of ultimate victory and of universal triumph.

But there was a second clause in the words which came to Jesus in the divine voice ... 'with Thee I am well pleased'. That is a quotation from Isaiah 42:1: 'Behold my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights.' This is part of the picture of the servant of the Lord., of the great and mysterious figure whose portrait culminates in Isaiah 53, of the one who was wounded for our transgressions and bruised for our iniquities, the one on whom the chastisement of our peace fell, the one who was to be like a sheep dumb before his shearers. When Jesus heard these words, he must have realized with blinding certainty that his ultimate victory was certain, that the way to it was the way of sorrow, of suffering, of sacrificial service, of self-dedication as an offering for the sins of men. So when Jesus heard the voice, he knew that he was God's chosen Messiah, but he also knew that the way for him was the way of the cross.

In the baptism, we see the self-identification of Jesus with men and the self-dedication of Jesus to the purposes of God. In Justyn Martyr's account of the baptism there is one strange addition to the story. Justin says: 'and then, when Jesus had gone to the river Jordan where John was baptizing, and when he had stepped into the water, a fire was kindled in Jordan.' This fire is also mentioned in the Gospel according to the Hebrews. Where Justin and that Gospel got that story we do not know and we cannot tell. But the story is symbolically true, for in that moment of the baptism there was kindled in the heart of Jesus a flame of sacrificial love which nothing in time or in eternity could ever extinguish." (From The Mind of Jesus, author William Barclay)

Chaplaincy Services at Hospitals in St. John's

When you are being admitted to a hospital in St. John's, you should be asked, "While you are admitted to hospital, would you like to have a visit from a chaplain or pastoral care worker?" Be sure to say "Yes" if you would like a pastoral visit. You will then be asked to identify your religion, and your name will be added to the chaplain's visitation list, and you will then receive a visit from the denominational chaplain within a day or two.

Also, the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Salvation Army and United Church Chaplaincy Teams are continuing a pilot project to assess ways to share resources. The four denominations will share First-call Chaplain responsibilities at the hospitals in St. John's. This means that each night one chaplain will receive all after-hours calls

(5:00 pm to 8:00 am). That First-call Chaplain will determine if the chaplain from the patient's own denomination is needed to provide particular services or supports (anointing/communion). Patients and families can request their denominational chaplain, if they so wish. The denominational chaplains will follow up with patients seen by the First-call Chaplain.

Please call your Parish Priest as well.
